On driving up to Sarah and Michael Shorrocks' Victorian home in Surrey, you would presume it had always been well looked after. In fact,

Although the property was a shadow of its former self, Sarah and Michael were determined to conserve and restore its original features. They used specialist craftsmen for a range of jobs, including overhauling and re-leading windows, all the heating had to be replumbed, the whole house needed rewiring, and builders were brought in to replace the chimneys and repair the roof. The priority was to get the place watertight. 'It was freezing when we moved in,' says Sarah, 'but once the structural changes were completed, we could start concentrating on the rooms.'

One of the first alterations they made internally was to create a kitchen by combining a couple of small rooms. Although it was an improvement, the dividing wall between the kitchen and the hallway still bothered Sarah. So eventually they knocked the existing breakfast room, kitchen, vestibule and laundry room together to make one large space. Another change that made a vast improvement was the introduction of French windows overlooking a courtyard where there had previously been just a window. 'The kitchen is now my favourite room,' says Sarah. 'It's where we entertain our ▶







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guests and gather as a family. I especially love the island as I can prepare food there while chatting.'

The hall floor was a particular labour of love. 'All the tiles were seconds,' says Sarah. 'They were reject encaustic tiles and took five days to lay. The firm that installed them for us had been putting them aside for about two years.'

'A flow of energy, removing obstacles and creating space, is key to good design,' she says, and her vision for their new home reflects this. 'I wanted it to be uplifting,' says Sarah, who also feels strongly about the environment. 'In these straitened times, people should reuse objects and furniture.'
